Project Performance

Poultry Vaccination ProjectKyeema Foundation & Picca





Chickens represent an important source of income and food for locals living in Mbuji Mayi. This project educates and provides local vaccinators a sphere of protection for village chickens against Newcastle disease. We are grateful to Kyeema Foundation & Partners in International Collaborative Aid Ltd. for their ongoing support in helping us teach our communities how to fish.

The report shows that, due to covid19 restrictions, this year only 7974 chickens were vaccinated in seventeen villages and the number of vaccinators has increased, they are now nine vaccinators instead of four initially trained. We have sent them a fridge that functions with solar energy.

Hence, they have now enough vaccines for the next vaccination campaign as opposed to 13000 chickens in the previous years.

With chickens increased now in number, they can feed their families, send children to school, and pay for medical care and finally reduce poverty in a sustainable way.



Project Performance

Rocket Stove Project Greater Springfield Rotary Club



Rotary Club of Greater Springfield secured a grant of \$4500 and \$1850 to run this project up to December 2021. The bricklayer was employed in Mbuji-Mayi/ Congo(DR.) to deliver the project and the delivery took place on the same day with Buddy2buddy solar project on 12 March 2021.

The report shows the impact is huge: so far 563 stoves were built in 12 villages .,- 100% of the families who use rocket stoves affirm that the quality of the air in the house has greatly improved when they are cooking.,- each household can now save woods, girls attend schools regularly instead of spending time collecting woods in the bush, study at home to review their lessons.



Project Performance

Congo Flavour Festival

Congo Flavour festival: we received \$5,000 from Multicultural Affairs of Queensland, \$8150 from Ipswich city council to celebrate a multicultural event and showcase of the Congolese culture. Though it was postponed three times due to covid19, it was held successfully on 13 March 2021.

Project Performance

Agricultural Micro Loan Project World Relief Australia (WRA)

A C N has partnered with World Relief Australia to deliver "Keeping girls at school through agriculture project." World Relied Australia has given us a grant of \$11000 to run an agriculture project to help parents keep their daughters in school.

Villagers have received a loan of \$200 each to use for their agriculture activities. At the end of the agriculture season 2020, instead of repaying the loan, they have decided to reuse the same loan and work as a team instead of working individually.

They have now common land where they planted the beans. The report shows that they use two hectares of land to grow beans, after the harvest, twenty-five students were supported by their parents for their studies including fifteen girls and ten boys i.e., the number of girls attending school has increased. Improvement of living conditions in families who took the loans

Buddy2Buddy Solar Project

ACN has partnered with the Rotary Club of Greater Springfield to deliver this year 3 projects:

Buddy2buddy solar project

Despite covid19 impact, fifty lights were delivered satisfactorily in a school in the Democratic Republic of Congo / Mbuji-Mayi, and reports show that the buddy students who received them wrote letters/ messages of thanks to their buddies who made the lights here in Australia.

We have reported back to Staines memorials College and Redbank Plains High schools.

We hope that these schools can run another project next year or create relationships with friend students in Congo.



Project Performance

Teacher in the Box Project

Teacher in a box provides offline access to educational materials to students who do not have internet access, at a minimal cost.

It was delivered in May 2021 thanks to Professor Patrice Kabeya Mwepu who traveled from South Africa with the laptop and trained them how to use it.

After the demonstration and training on how to use it, huge needs have arisen or emerged, they need more than 150 laptops for schools and community centers.

With Rotary Club of Greater Springfield, we are working on fundraising to provide for these needs. A fundraising dinner will be held on 02/11/2022 in the civic centre, Ipswich city council.



Fundraising Overview
